Accelerate your learning with Headstart

Are you a motivated Year 10–12 student who wants to be challenged with university-level learning and gain credit towards a degree? With Headstart, you can explore degrees that interest you, experience life as a uni student and enhance your academic skills as you blend high school learning with tertiary study.

You can complete up to four first-year UniSC subjects (one per semester) while in Years 10–12.

You don't just get to study at universitylevel — you also become a UniSC student, working alongside our other students.

Enrol in Headstart to find new and exciting opportunities and challenges as you experience university study first-hand.

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Available for students in Year 11 and 12, and the second semester of Year 10

If you're in Year 10, you can now apply to study Headstart in Semester 2 (July), giving you the opportunity to gain insight into university subjects and career pathways before commencing your senior studies. Completing Headstart in Year 10 will advance your learning and set you up for success in your future study.

Check your eligibility

We have high expectations for students who start university while still in school. Entry into Headstart is competitive and is based on your academic achievements.

To apply you must:

- be an Australian citizen, New Zealand citizen or Australian permanent resident (ie domestic student). International students should speak with their school's Headstart Coordinator about their eligibility for the program
- be completing a full workload of Year 10, 11 or 12. Year 10 students can only enrol in Headstart during Semester 2 (July)
- be achieving a B-grade average or better*
- meet any prerequisites applicable to your chosen course
- have approval and a positive
 recommendation from your school
- * Special circumstances may be considered on a case-bycase basis. Your school must attach a written statement outlining a case for consideration.

Headstart students are a step ahead

You'll be supported all the way

University may seem like a big step, but you'll be supported by UniSC and your school. Before you start classes, you will be invited to attend an Orientation session to help you get started with your studies.

Your school is there to help you balance school and university, and your university subject teachers will give you guidance and feedback throughout your studies.

You'll also have access to UniSC's student support services, and staff are on hand if you have questions. Support services include:

- Career advice, including one-on-one appointments with the UniSC Career Development Team
- Academic skills workshops, study drop-ins and one-on-one sessions with an academic skills adviser
- Indigenous academic mentoring and services
- Health and wellbeing services, including free counselling sessions

At UniSC, we're here to help you succeed. Our Student Experience Mentors are current students who can talk with you about your studies and give you timely guidance and information to help you thrive. We are likely to reach out to you via phone, email or SMS during your time at UniSC.

There are so many reasons to study Headstart

Gain credit towards a UniSC degree

This means you'll have fewer subjects to study when you start your degree.

Prepare for university

When you get to university, you'll be well prepared. You'll have already completed study at this level, experienced classes, completed assessments and enjoyed uni life.

Broaden your education

Select a Headstart subject in an area not offered by your school, or use it as an opportunity to try out future career choices.

Receive adjustment factors

You'll receive a bonus adjustment to your ATAR for every Headstart subject you successfully complete (one rank per course).¹

Gain QCE points

Completed university subjects can contribute towards your QCE. One semester counts for two credits.²

Enhance your school performance

Studying at a more advanced level can improve your performance at school, because you'll be learning new academic skills and will have access to extra study resources.

Save money

Your first Headstart subject is free and further subjects are at a reduced fee, decreasing the overall cost of your degree.³

Gain entry into university without an ATAR

If you're not working towards an ATAR, Headstart can provide a pathway option for you to gain entry into university. By successfully completing two or more Headstart courses, you'll receive a selection rank that could get you into a university program.⁴

Set yourself apart

Add your Headstart studies to your CV to get ahead of the pack by making employers aware that you're eager to learn and challenge yourself beyond what is expected.

Study commitments and expectations

Whether you're studying on campus or online, as a Headstart student you'll attend the same classes as first-year UniSC students. Your coursework will include the same readings, assignments and exams. You'll be expected to complete all assessments and contribute to group assignments and presentations.

Managing your time

Years 10–12 are busy years, and we know completing a university subject while still in school is a big commitment.

That's why it's important to maintain a balance of schoolwork, university study, sport, family commitments and fun. To ensure you get the right balance, it's best to prepare a study plan early and set weekly goals to stay on top of your studies.

Don't be afraid to reach out for support if you need it. It's also important to meet regularly with your school to discuss your progress.

Withdrawing from Headstart

If you're finding keeping up with the workload challenging, seek out the available support services to get you back on track.

If you've decided that Headstart is not working out this time and you'd like to withdraw from your subject, speak with your school's Headstart Coordinator and then notify UniSC Student Central via email to studentcentral@usc.edu.au

It's important to formally withdraw from your subject before the academic penalty date to avoid receiving a failing grade on your UniSC transcript.

Withdrawing from a Headstart subject prior to the census date will not affect your GPA at UniSC. Each subject is taught over **13 weeks of classes**, followed by a two-week exam period (from February to June in Semester 1, and from July to November in Semester 2). You will need to be able to attend classes and complete coursework during this time.

Generally, Headstart students have 2–5 hours of class time per week. Check your course outline online to see how often you may need to head to campus or log in to a class. Classes run between 8am and 9pm, Monday to Friday.

A university subject usually requires you to **attend a tutorial each week**. Some have an additional workshop, rehearsal or laboratory session, too. Traditional lectures are being replaced with seminars held throughout the semester, supported with interactive online learning materials.

Choosing to study Headstart online can be a great option if you need flexibility or if you live further away from our campuses. You'll complete online learning materials, which may include podcasts, interviews, simulations, screencasts, recorded discussions and quizzes. An online course can give you the ability to study at your own pace, however some courses may include scheduled classes.

Seminars usually run for 1–2 hours with teaching staff presenting themes and concepts related to your subject.

Tutorials, workshops and laboratories are similar to classes you might attend at school and can run for 1–3 hours.

You'll need to set aside **12.5 hours per week for personal study** (including class time). You will have online **learning materials** to guide your learning during your personal study. This might include eModules, quizzes, podcasts or videos to review. This time is when you'll complete set readings, write your assignments and revise for exams. This is in addition to your regular school study.

Just like regular students, you'll need to **check the Student Portal and your UniSC email account regularly** and log into Canvas throughout the semester.

Costs and financial support

One of the best things about Headstart is that there is no tuition fee for the first Headstart subject you complete.*

Additional subjects have a reduced fee (\$400 in 2023; refer to **usc.edu.au/fees** for 2024/2025 amount).

You should allow approximately an additional \$100 per course for textbooks, photocopying and any other study-related costs.

If you're applying for another Headstart subject, you may be eligible for a scholarship to assist with your second and subsequent Headstart courses.

A number of scholarships are available for students from low-income families, or who identify with other recognised equity groups, including Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples, or students with disability.

You can apply for a scholarship when you submit your continuing Headstart application form.

What to expect next?

Receive an offer

If your application is successful, UniSC will email you an official offer that includes instructions to complete your enrolment and attend Orientation. Remember to check your email account regularly and throughout any school holidays so you don't miss your offer.

Organise timetable and submit class preference form

When timetables are released, select your preferred class times. You will receive instructions on how to submit your class preference form in your enrolment and Orientation information. UniSC will make every effort to enrol you in your preferred classes, but it's good to have back-up options in case your preferred times are not available.

Check in with your Headstart Coordinator

As a uni student, you're in control of your studies but it's still important to keep your school informed on your Headstart studies. Make sure to check in with your school's Headstart Coordinator frequently to keep them updated on the course you're studying, your class timetable, and how you're managing with balancing your school and uni studies.

Create a pathway to UniSC

If you're not working towards an ATAR, Headstart can provide a pathway option for you to gain entry into university. By completing two or more Headstart courses, you'll receive a selection rank that could get you into a university program.*

One of the great things about Headstart is that it can give you credit towards your UniSC degree. If you successfully complete subjects through Headstart, then enrol in a related UniSC program, you'll have fewer courses to complete to get your degree.

To continue your studies at UniSC after you finish Year 12, you apply through QTAC and include in your application that you have completed Headstart.

Credit may be granted for related degrees at other universities, but this is subject to approval by the relevant university through their individual credit process.

* Headstart selection ranks may not be adequate to gain entry into some high-demand programs.

5 tips for uni success

Starting uni can be an exciting, life-changing experience, though also a bit daunting. To help minimise the stress of getting started with Headstart, here are our top tips for success at university.

Attend Orientation

We'll email you to let you know when Headstart Orientation will be held. This is a great chance to ask any questions you might have about your course, and meet other students in the Headstart program. You're also welcome to attend other Orientation activities alongside first-year university students. There's heaps of entertainment and freebies to look out for, too.





Go to class and put in the work

It can be easy to lose steam to go to class or complete the readings each week, but putting in the work can really pay off. Students who attend all classes and complete weekly activities tend to receive higher grades than those who don't. Your lecturers and tutors are your connection to your chosen industry, so getting to know them will be key in setting up your future career path.

Get support – you're not alone

University can be an exciting and sometimes unfamiliar journey, but know that you are supported throughout the entire process. When you start, you'll be emailed a **Starting at UniSC Toolkit** — make sure you fill this out to receive customised support and tips. Access study resources online via Canvas and the Student Portal. You can also chat online with a librarian. If you need any help — just ask.





Find a balance

Uni life gives you freedom to choose how you approach your study. You can start classes later in the day, or study around your school commitments. Using a diary or a planner can help you to keep track of assessment, classes, school commitments, and your social life. Make sure to find a balance between working hard and having fun.

Get involved

The best part of uni life is meeting like-minded people and getting involved in a study area you're passionate about. There are plenty of social activities, campus events, clubs, societies and sports teams to get involved in. Orientation will introduce you to many of these exciting opportunities, but make sure to keep an eye out for them throughout your Headstart studies.



Tips to support your student through Headstart >>

Headstart provides a challenge beyond the school curriculum, offering your child the chance to gain a taste of university life and enhance their academic performance. They'll grow as individuals as they develop the independence that university learning provides.





Plan for success

- Encourage your student to attend all classes, as this is where they'll get the most out of their learning experience and have the opportunity to discuss class content with their peers, lecturers and tutors.
- Create a study plan to help them stay on track, reduce stress and maintain a balance between uni, school and being a teenager.
- Remind your student to ask questions, especially in the first few weeks, and check-in with them regularly to see how they're going.



Encourage independence

- Encourage your student to find information and services for themselves, and to not be afraid to ask questions or seek support.
- Once your child enrols into their Headstart subject, they'll become a UniSC student and will be required to manage their own learning, including being the main point of contact for the university.



Celebrate achievements

• Acknowledging their success and celebrating small achievements throughout the study year will help to maintain confidence and motivation ahead of the next academic challenge.



Guide your student to the range of free support services

 As a UniSC student, your child has access to a range of services available to support student success and wellbeing, including academic and study support, wellbeing and counselling, AccessAbility, careers and employment and Indigenous student support.



Be flexible with family commitments

- There are times during the semester when students really need to focus on their studies. They'll be required to complete all aspects of assessment, including exams, so they must be available during exam weeks.
